**A**rms folded, hands and feet to self


Respect yourself and others

Take a look at the different areas of our school and how are rules are adapted to the settings.




# **Classroom Spotlights**






213 is a classroom with 1st-3rd graders. We love working on our academic goals and curriculum, but we also focus on communication, sitting and paying attention, and playing with others.












The ESPs in 213 are the best of the best! They love each of our students, and we work well to create a fun learning environment!

# **Hello from Class 111**

Every morning we have a list of songs we listen to as we get ready to begin our day. The list always ends with Usher and the Sesame Street characters singing the ABC song. We then listen to our recording devices where our family assist us in telling our teachers how our evening was. We love hearing what our friends did the night before.

As a class, we do academics, communication, OT, and PT. This month we are reading the book The Big Red Barn. We are learning about different farm animals, the noises they make, what food grows on a farm, and the different chores on a farm. With our speech therapist, Bonnie, through switches, yes/no cards, listening to vocalizations and watching our facial expressions, we make choices and express our wants and needs. We wear our hand braces and DAFO's, stand in supportive standers, ride bikes, bounce on a big ball, sit in different positions, taste different foods, feel different textures and work on grasp and release. We love our OT and PT, Hailee and Melissa.

We love hanging out with each other and worry about our friends when they are not at school. Our teachers say we are the best class in the school, but I think they might be a little biased.







# APE at KSHS Adaptive Physical Ed



APE provides skills to participate in a variety of activities so students maintain a healthy lifestyle and participate in physical activities.

Our APE program is both skill based and recreation based. During each class a skill lesson is taught and part of the class is devoted to play and recreation skills. Our program is individualized to meet each student's unique needs and abilities.

#### **Academic Focus**

As a school we are focusing on the following academic concepts depending on what grade level and class your student is in –

Secondary students are reading the book Mr. Poppers Penguins Elementary students are reading The Big Red Barn

### Language Arts:

- Identifying details, individuals, or events in a familiar story
- Identify craft and structure of a book (front cover, title, open a book, turn pages)
- Answer who, what where questions
- Order events in a text
- Make predictions
- Understand action words
- Identify emotions
- Retell events in a story
- Compare different types of texts

#### Math:

- 1:1 correspondence
- Identify equal and unequal sets
- Identify if a group of objects has more or less
- Identify written number words 1-10
- Use writing to communicate (beginning and ending punctuation, patterns, rhymes, topic, details)
- Sequence numbers
- Compare numbers
- Place Value
- Use a number line
- Find a mystery number

Behavior: Positive Behavioral Supports

As a school we work on the "Get Ready" program and teach the school-wide rules and what they look like in each area of the building every day.

This month as a staff we are focusing on using precision requests:

- •Precision requests are a way to give directions to a class, small group, or individual to increase compliance and reduce the likelihood that the request will be ignored.
- \*They are neutral, predictable, and reliable.
- •They are not magic that works every time, but the more you use them at appropriate times, the more effective they will become.
- •Precision requests are how we give directions to students, and are most effective when all adults in the classroom are using them in the same manner.

ACA (Affordable Care Act) Open Enrollment is **November 1, 2021–January 15, 2022**. You can apply for affordable coverage through the Marketplace, and we can help!

Also, don't forget we can help you apply for Medicaid, Disability Medicaid, Emergency Medicaid for non-citizens, and the new Medicaid Expansion for Adults also CHIP (Children's Health Insurance Program).

ACA, Medicaid and CHIP all include Essential Health Benefits such as Hospital and Emergency care, Preventative Care, Mental Health Services, Prescriptions, Doctor Visits and more.

Children who may qualify for CHIP must meet income guidelines and be:

- Under age 19
- Not currently covered by health insurance
- US citizens or legal residents

# **November**



### **Learning Themes**

Speech is grateful for senses this month! During our large speech groups, we are focusing on our senses (i.e. hear, smell, taste) and will be teaching the following concepts: identifying, labeling, requesting and commenting. Students will be hearing different sounds from animals (e.g. horse, chicken, lamb, rooster, penguins, etc.), smells from the farm (e.g. apples, hay, bird food, etc.) and taste various foods. Core vocabulary words we will focus on this month are, "good," "bad," and "thank you."





## Language at Home

Help your student make these concepts practical at home! Your student can practice expressing gratitude (i.e. thank you) after receiving a desired food, item and/or activity. In addition, your student can practice using their senses (e.g. hear, smell, taste) and express whether the food, item and/or activity is "good" or "bad."

### **Book of the Month**

Our elementary classrooms are reading, "Big Red Barn" by Margaret Wise Brown. The secondary classrooms are reading, "Mr. Popper's Penguins" by Florence and Richard Atwater.
