

Musical Spotlight

Music Spotlight: "Please Stand Up"

Thomas is an incredibly talented musician with perfect pitch. The music therapists over the past years have created different songs to help Thomas with receptive and expressive language.

For example, to encourage Thomas to transition from his classroom, teachers will sing "please stand up". Turning directions into social songs help students with disabilities process the information while maintaining their attention.

School wide, we use the "Get Ready" song to teach our students how to get their bodies ready to learn.

While Thomas continues to work on learning new melodic tunes to express his wants and needs, he also loves coming up with his own melodies. Thomas will sit down at the piano each



individual music time and challenge Cassie to a new melody. When she's too slow to keep up with his perfect piano skills he will slow it down and take her hand to teach her one note at a time. Our students are some of the best teachers.


Learning Themes

Speech is getting spooky this month! During our Large Speech groups, we will be teaching the following concepts and vocabulary words: Sequencing, action words (e.g., walk, clomp, wiggle, shake, clap, nod, knock), clothing items (e.g., shoes, pants, shirts, gloves, hat), the emotion of "scared" (afraid/ not afraid), and the core words "stop" and "go."

Language at Home

To help your child strengthen and generalize these concepts and vocabulary words, you can practice them in your home using a variety of activities. Halloween activities (e.g., haunted houses, pumpkin patches, costume shops, films, books) are a great way of teaching the emotion of "afraid/ not afraid." So have fun discovering what your child IS or IS NOT afraid of this Halloween season, and remember to take the opportunity to help them label/identify the emotion that they are feeling. In addition, as your child gets dressed in the mornings, have them tell you (or you label the clothing item for them) as they put it on. You could also play some Halloween music while modeling some of the action words mentioned above, and then reinforce the words of "stop" and "go" by stopping and starting the music as your child imitates these actions.





Book of the Month

This month, the elementary classrooms are reading, "The Little Old Lady Who Wasn't Afraid of Anything," by Linda Williams. The secondary classrooms are reading chapters 3 and 4 of 'Mr. Popper's Penguins" by Florence and Richard Atwater. Since repetition is critical in language development, head over to your local library, check out these books, and enjoy some storytime together with your child!

Nurses update

Please see the following letter from nursing.

Dear Parent(s) or Guardian:

Your child, if in grades K, 1,3,5,7,10, 13 or graduating this year, may be given a vision screening during this school year. Before screening is conducted, state law requires parents be informed that vision screening is not a substitute for an eye examination by an eye care specialist. Because academic learning is 80% visual, and visual problems are best detected and treated early, a comprehensive eye and vision examination is recommended. Healthy eyes and good vision are essential for success in school.

Vision screening may take place at any point during the school year. The vision screening method used at KSHS is performed with a photo screener by the school nurse.

You will receive a referral letter if your child fails the screening. However, even if your child passes, it is important that your child see an eye care specialist once a year.


School vision screening does not evaluate eye health and cannot uncover important vision problems or prescribe treatment. Vision referral aggregate numbers will be reported to the Utah State Department of Health annually.

Please provide the school with written notification if you do not want your child to participate in the screening program.
