UPDATE ON BUILDING ADDITION

The building addition on the back of our school is on schedule! They tell me it will be complete mid-December or so. What a wonderful Christmas present that will be for our students and staff. We have a weekly meeting with the architect and construction crew and I toured the construction zone Monday — it looks just like our current rooms but it's so shiny and new. The architect took great care to match everything inside and out so it will look like it's always been here.

The new addition will add 6 classrooms to our school! Also, 2 classrooms were renovated over the summer in order to tie the new wing into the existing school. Technology has been updated since we opened 9 years ago, so we will enjoy new technology in each of the new rooms. These rooms will also have a better designed ceiling lift system since it was built in rather than added on later like in the original build.

The best part may be the new playground, thanks to generous donors who have contributed to our playground fund over the past few years. The play area was developed with access for students in wheelchairs and will fit nicely between the existing pool wall and the new addition. The north wall of the new addition is filled with floor to ceiling windows that allow lots of natural light and a nice view of the new play area.

I want to give a special thank you to the Jordan School District Board of Education for their support of our students and the program we provide through our school. The addition will allow us to meet the needs of the growing student population in our district.

NOTES FROM NURSING

Dear Parent(s) or Guardian:

Students not currently followed by an eye doctor & in grades K, 1,3,5, & 7 will be given a photo vision screening sometime during this school year. The vision screening method used at KSHS is performed with a photo screener by the school nurse. Before screening is conducted, state law requires parents be informed that vision screening is not a substitute for an eye examination by an eye care specialist.

If your child fails the screening, a referral letter will be sent home in their backpack. Please return to the nurses a copy of the eye care specialist's exam results once obtained. However, even if your child passes, it is important that your child see an eye care specialist once a year. School vision screening does not evaluate eye health and cannot uncover important vision problems or prescribe treatment. Vision referral information on children age 8 and under will be reported to the Utah State Division for the Blind and Visually Impaired as stated in Utah Law 53A-11-203.

Because academic learning is 80% visual, and visual problems are best detected and treated early, a comprehensive eye and vision examination is recommended. Healthy eyes and good vision are essential for success in school.

Please provide the school with written notification before October 15th, if you do not want your child to participate in the vision screening program.

Best Treatment for Minimizing Calculus Buildup in Children with G/J-Tubes

Students with G/J-Tubes often have buildup of calculus in their mouths. The source of this problem is poor oral musculature control which is usually the reason that they are G tube fed to begin with. There are two main reasons why the buildup of calculus occurs without good muscle control:

- 1. There is poor swallowing function and so the saliva that is produced will sit and pool in their mouth, sometimes exiting the mouth as drool. When the saliva pools in their mouth, the chemicals that are in it like calcium and phosphorus, along with inherent plaque, adhere to the teeth and cause the buildup of calculus.
- 2. If they are continual mouth breathers, then the liquid part of the saliva dries up and the chemicals along with inherent plaque are left behind, turning into calculus.

The process of eating, chewing & swallowing food serves to self-cleanse the mouth and tends to decrease this build-up of calculus. There are no medicines, moisturizers or creams that can decrease this build up. Tartar control toothpaste can help only slightly. The best thing to do to minimize plaque is to brush with an electric toothbrush. These are most effective at minimizing the build-up of calculus. Battery operated electric toothbrushes can be purchased for as little as \$5 at your local grocery store. However, brushing alone will not completely eliminate the buildup of calculus altogether. It's important for children with G/J-tubes to have their teeth cleaned, under general anesthesia if necessary, every 1 to 2 years.
